

# blenny

## care sheet



Many aquarium species are found in the tropical Indo-Pacific ocean. These close relatives of gobies are intelligent, entertaining and rather territorial. Be careful when placing your hands into an aquarium with a fang blenny, as they have a venomous bite which they may use to defend themselves against a perceived threat.

### facts

average adult size:	3 to 5 inches long, or herbivore depending on species
average life span:	depends on species
diet:	omnivore or herbivore depending on species
minimum aquarium size:	29+ gallons, depending on species
water temperature:	72 to 78°F
specific gravity:	1.020 to 1.025

### diet

A well-balanced blenny diet consists of:

- Varied diet including mysis shrimp, brine shrimp, flakes, pellets and frozen food.
- Vary diet to ensure proper nutritional balance.

### feeding

Things to remember when feeding your blenny:

- Feed 1 to 2 times daily, no more than fish can eat in 1 to 2 minutes.
- Thaw frozen food before feeding.

### housing

- Keep in an appropriately sized aquarium; provide plants, rock and décor for hiding places and plenty of room for movement.
- Live rock can provide a natural food source and hiding places while also enhancing biological filtration.
- **Stable water quality and parameters are critical to the health of aquatic life. If you are unsure of your water quality, Petco provides free water testing.**

### normal behavior

- Some can be territorial and need plenty of hiding places; especially like to hide in live rock.
- Many can only swim a short distance at a time, so it looks like they're hopping, not swimming.
- Usually inhabit the bottom of the tank.

### habitat maintenance

- **Daily:** Check filter, water temperature, specific gravity and other equipment.
- **Weekly:** Check water quality at least once a week.
- **Monthly:** Change 10 to 25% of the total volume of water every 2 to 4 weeks, or as needed. Introduce new inhabitants to the aquarium gradually.

### compatibility

- Compatible with dwarf and large angelfish, cardinalfish, clownfish, damselfish, gobies, hawkfish and tangs.
- Unless kept in a breeding pair, keep only one blenny per aquarium.

### signs of a healthy fish

- Clear eyes
- Eats vigorously
- Hides most of the time
- Fins completely intact and undamaged

**Avoid overcrowded conditions, which are a major cause of stress and disease. Maintain good water quality with regular water changes and adequate filtration.**

### red flags

- Loss of color or appetite
- Spots or fungus on body or mouth
- Listlessness
- Labored respiration
- Weight loss
- Cloudy eyes
- Erratic swimming

### common health issues

Health Issue	Symptoms or Causes	Suggested Action
Fin rot	Frayed or disintegrating fins; the base of the fins usually reddens.	Improve water quality; consult your aquatic veterinarian for treatment.
Marine ich	Cysts on fins, gills and skin; labored respiration, excess skin mucus or pale skin.	Treat entire aquarium with a commercial parasite remedy and improve water quality; freshwater dips can dislodge the parasites.

*If you notice any of these signs, check water quality and improve as necessary.*
